


Faculty Review of Open eTextbooks

Faculty received a stipend for their efforts and funding was provided by the State of California, the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.



- Provides a concise balanced history, but it's a rather flat read that doesn't allow the reader to engage with the past. The book offers a macro-level understanding of the past, without allowing for a nuanced understanding of daily life and social and cultural interactions. This is fine if professors want primary sources, lectures, and discussions to fill this gap.
- Introduced but didn't fully develop/explain some topics. For example, it described the origins of the Salem Witch Hunts and their relationship to King Philip's War but did not strongly situate it within its historical context or explain how the events played out.

- Also, the website has different tabs for the textbook, images, bios of people, primary sources, etc. The images, primary sources, etc. are great; however, they don't seem to be linked to the textbook, so you read the book without seeing any of the images or having links to the primary sources. Professors already have a difficult time trying to get students to make connections between historical sources and events, seems like this format will provide challenges.
