


## **Faculty Review of Open eTextbooks**

The <u>California Open Educational Resources Council</u> has designed and implemented a faculty review process of the free and open etextbooks showcased within the California Open Online Library for Education (<u>www.cool4ed.org</u>). Faculty from the California Community Colleges, the California State University, and the University of California were invited to review the selected no/low cost and open etextboks using a rubric. Faculty received a stipend for their efforts and funding was provided by the State of California, the William and Flora Hewlett Foundation, and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

- There are some simplifications that should be corrected. For examples, the statement that "The oldest settlement in North America is the city of St. Augustine in Florida" is not technically true. Also, the author identifies New Amsterdam as a Dutch colony, but it should read "New Netherland" (for both references, see http://www.sageamericanhistory.net/colonial/topics/colonialintro.html)
- Multiple "Resources" link to Wikipedia pages. Since the content of Wikipedia pages is not properly vetted, this could have an impact on the quality of the subject matter that is being presented to students. Refer to the "Resources" links at http://www.sageamericanhistory.net/colonial/index.html; Six of the twelve resources are Wikipedia pages.
- At times the text assumes a nationalist stance, which can be construed as biased. For example, there are references to the American character as "bold, adventurous... determined to prosper"
  (http://www.sageamericanhistory.net/colonial/topics/colonialintro.html) and the Constitution as "the most profound political document ever produced by man"
  http://www.sageamericanhistory.net/colonial/topics/amhistintro.htm
- Some of the primary sources used and historians cited are quite dated. Some primary sources date to the 1950s or earlier.

Please provide comments on any aspect of the subject matter of this textbook:

- There are numerous errors throughout the text. Here are just a few of them:
  - The phrase "This course is not include" should read "This course does not include" (in second paragraph of subsection "American Southwest" in "Colonial America" section); in the same section, the first letter in the sentence that begins "we should keep in mind" ought to be capitalized.
  - I think that a word or two is missing from the phrase "we would mere chronology" (see subsection "What Is American History About?" on page http://www.sageamericanhistory.net/colonial/topics/amhistintro.htm)
  - A space is needed between "Itwould" in the subsection titled "Prehistory: The Origins of the Age of Discovery" (same URL as above).
  - The phrase "The Enlightenment, which we have Lori discussed, have generated new ways of thinking," has a few errors in it
    - (http://www.sageamericanhistory.net/colonies\_empire/topics/amrevoverview.html)
  - This quote by Franklin is incorrect: "As Ben Franklin said, 'We had best hang together, or we shall surely hand separately.' " (same page as above).
  - The phrase "Washington held the shaky revolutionary was together long enough" needs to be corrected

  - The phrase "The created a dangerous situation" should be fixed (<u>http://www.sageamericanhistory.net/jeffersonian/topics/america\_europe.html</u>)
  - The following paragraph that begins "Many southerners who were opposed to slavery stuck with it because of large amounts of invested capital in land and cotton and slaves" is duplicated on page

• The primary sources that are linked/embedded throughout the pages are quite useful when the links function. Portions of the text could be used to supplement other materials.

What areas of this textbook require improvement in order for it to be used in your courses?

 In its current state, this resource lacks the breadth of coverage that is necessary for a lower division, general education course. The text also does not seem to take alternate points of view into consideration. This resource would have to be expanded – especially the sections on Native Americans and women –and vetted in order to be considered appropriate for use as a textbook.
